### Profile

Dan Ross joined Brown, Goldstein & Levy as a Disability Rights Fellow in September 2011. His practice focused on issues related to disability rights litigation, as well as general civil litigation. In many cases, Dan represented people who have been denied educational and employment opportunities because of the use of inaccessible technology in schools, offices, and other places of public accommodation.

During law school, Dan interned at the American Civil Liberties Union's LGBT/AIDS Project and the San Francisco District Attorney's Office. He also participated in pro bono projects representing state employees in grievance hearings and served as Articles Development Editor of the Virginia Journal of Criminal Law.

Dan's master's thesis, "Rethinking the Road to Gault: Limiting Social Control in the Juvenile Court, 1957-1972" won the Law School's Roger & Madeleine Traynor Prize and was published in the Virginia Law Review in April 2012.

Prior to law school, Dan was an executive search consultant serving institutions of higher education.
